NFPA 1072 Dangerous Goods, Responder – Operations Level

Calendar Description

This course gives the student the basic knowledge and skills to predict the behaviour of both dangerous goods and their containers. This is the only way the potential harm to life, environment and property can be estimated. Students also learn to plan a response, protect themselves and their equipment from contamination, implement the response, monitor the incident, and evaluate the progress of the response.

Rationale

Once you know there are dangerous goods at the scene, the first responder, at the operational level, must take steps to analyze the incident. Containers and materials must be identified, conditions must be evaluated and you must determine if dangerous goods have been released. This information forms the basis of the dangerous goods team's approach to the incident and will help control the incident scene.

Course Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to

1. identify and explain the roles and responsibilities of operations level personnel at a dangerous goods incident.
2. identify and explain the hazards and tactical considerations when operating at a dangerous goods incident.
3. identify and demonstrate the procedures for responding to a dangerous goods incident. Determine control zones, identify need to initiate shelter in-place or evacuation, demonstrate emergency decontamination procedures and preserve evidence.

4. identify, explain, and demonstrate operational level tasks and responsibilities in relation to safety, communication, equipment/product use and maintenance, and search and rescue missions
5. define the chemical and physical properties of dangerous goods and differentiate between hazardous situations at the scene, including container and tank stability.
