Understanding Trauma

Calendar Description

This course is an introduction to many different forms of psychological trauma. It includes symptomology, long term and short term effects along with treatment options. It also explains in detail the trauma-informed model.

Rationale

This course is required in the Community Mental Health certificate program. Trauma is one of the leading causes of mental illness in Canadian society. At some point in a person's life one will experience some form of trauma. The caregiver will be able to identify possible causes of long term mental health concerns and to understand behaviors that one may observe.
