Ethics and Law

Calendar Description

This course is designed to provide the student with an introduction to Ethics. It looks at the historical background, moral development, ethics and law, critical thinking, client rights, and the ethical decision making process and tools. Students engage in self-reflection as they examine their personal and professional values. Students are given the opportunity to utilize the course information by working through case studies. In addition, the professional Code of Ethics is examined.

Rationale

This is a required course for the Child and Youth Care and for the Community Mental Health certificate students. Students encounter personal and professional situations where they are challenged ethically and morally. Students need to understand who they are as individuals and possess skills and tools that assist them in making ethical decisions.

1. present greater self-awareness regarding their values, beliefs, morals, and ethical self.
2. articulate the influence of personal and professional ethics when building resiliency working with children, youth and families.

4. defend evidence based information relevant to court proceedings.
5. apply the decision making tools to case studies.
6. demonstrate key components contained in the professional code of Ethics.

7. model critical thinking as it applies to case studies.
8. identify the rights of clients within a helping relationship.
9. present ethical issues in a respectful and objective manner.
