Family Support & Intervention

Calendar Description

This course emphasizes the dynamics, functions, and elements of family systems. The course is taught using lectures, class discussion, a hands on assignment and guest speakers. Students are given the opportunity to apply what they are learning and to examine their own family of origin and its impact on the CYC professional.

Rationale

This is a required course for second year Child and Youth Care students. Students need to develop an ability to assess a family and plan for an effective intervention, designed to meet the needs of each family member.

Course Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to

1. describe the impact that the family of origin has on them as an individual and as a CYC professional.
2. explain how relationships and mental and physical health are interdependent in family life.
3. describe the role of the CYC worker within the family system.
4. demonstrate an ability to assess family dynamics, which include family values, roles, developmental stages, communication patterns, and strengths, and challenges.
5. demonstrate an ability to determine needs and goals for families.
6. develop an intervention (service) plan that address identified needs.
7. describe the methods that evaluate family change.
8. identify and discuss elements of a CYC approach to working with families.
